Free Parent and Teen New Driver Training Program
P.R.I.D.E. Program Open to Local Teens and Family

KENNESAW— Parents can participate with their teens in a free 3-hour training program that can save teen lives. The National Teen Research Center and Joshua Brown Foundation will offer the training program on Thursday, May 3, 2007, at 6:30 PM at the A.L. Burruss Institute located at the Kennesaw State University Continuing Education Facility, 3333 Busbee Drive, Kennesaw, GA 30144, west (rear) entrance.

The program will include a comprehensive program to the public designed to help parents and their new (or soon to be) teen drivers learn what they need to do during the 40 hours of supervised practice driving time required by Georgia law.

The P.R.I.D.E. (Parents Reducing Incidents of Driver Error) program is a statewide educational program developed by the Georgia Traffic Injury Prevention Institute, an educational outreach unit of the University of Georgia.

The program will include a panel discussion with Alan Brown, local law enforcement and by the event's sponsors, including State Farm, Cingular, and the Safe Teen Driving Club.

The program is limited to the first 50 parent(s)/teen groups, so we encourage anyone interested in attending to sign up as soon as possible.
